

**Collaborating with Stranger Workshop for Grant Seekers in and outside the Humanities
December 6, 2012**

A CoLAB was conducted for grant seekers in the Humanities. The CoLAB included presentations by Ben Hebblethwaite, Assistant Professor in Haitian French and Creole, Jill Sonke, Professor in the School of Theatre and Dance, and Director of Center of Arts in Healthcare and Manuel Vasquez, Professor of Religion. The guest presentations were followed by a presentation from Bess de Farber, Facilitator and Creator of CoLAB, on theories on collaboration, creativity and grant seeking strategies. Participants then had one-on-one 3-minute speed-meetings before posting ideas and thoughts. Below is the evaluation of the December 6 CoLAB for grant seekers in the Humanities.

The participants in the CoLAB included 25 faculty, 1 postdoc, 9 graduate students, 2 undergraduate students and 6 staff. Of the 43 participants, 9 were international participants.

Survey Questions (Q1-Q7)

(Question 1) Length of Collaborating with Strangers Workshop

Most participants (75.0%) thought that this “collaborating with strangers workshop” was adequate in length (see TABLE 1). Meanwhile, 9.1 % of the participants thought the workshop was too short and 9.1% felt the workshop was too long.

(Question 2) My overall evaluation?

When participants were asked to evaluate the workshop (e.g. My overall evaluation?), 64.3% of the participants gave the workshop an “Excellent” evaluation. Meanwhile, 33.3% of the participants graded this workshop “Good” as their overall evaluation. One participant rated the workshop as “Fair” and none rated it as “Poor”. This question results was shown in Table 2.

(Question 3) I would attend a workshop like this again?

When participants were asked about whether they would attend a workshop like this again, most of them said “yes” (95.2%), while only 2 participants (4.8%) answered “no” to this question. The results are shown in Table 3.

(Question 4) I would recommend this collaboration process to other students/faculty.

Table 4 presents the results of question 4 (e.g. “I would recommend this collaboration process to other students/faculty.”). The results of this question indicated that this workshop had a very positive feedback, since 40 participants out of 44 chose “Yes”, and only 4 participants chose “No”.

Questions 5.1-5.2 are 5-point Likert scale questions to evaluate participants’ self-evaluation outcomes after the workshop. Options ranged from “Strongly Agree” to “Strongly Disagree”. The results of these 2-question series are shown below.

(Question 5.1) CoLAB workshop results:

I feel more confident in my ability to approach people I don’t know.

Table 5 presents the results of question 5.1. Among all 42 participants who responded to the question, 33.3% of the participants (i.e., 14 participants) selected “Strongly Agree” option, and 42.9% of the participants (i.e. 18 participants) chose “Agree” option. Overall, 76.2% of the

participants indicated a positive feedback on this question. The remaining responses were “Neutral” with nobody disagreeing or strongly disagreeing.

(Question 5.2) CoLAB workshop results:

I am more comfortable with people in other disciplines.

Table 6 presents the results of question 5.2. For the 41 participants responding, the responses were similar to the responses to Question 5.1. That is, 31.7% strongly agreed, 36.6% agreed and 29.3% were neutral.

Open-Ended Responses

The responses to questions 6 and 7 below show that the CoLAB facilitation process did help most of the participants access new resources. The primary resource was connecting with other people in different disciplines. In addition, the most useful part of the workshop was the 3-minute speed-meetings. However, participants were also positive about the speakers and the Ideas and Thoughts Boards. The results of the Ideas and Thoughts Boards were similar to the open-ended questions below. The specific responses are contained in the Appendix below.

(Question 6) Did the CoLAB facilitation process help you access new resources? If so, describe.

- Yes...but I need to know more about other disciplines before I meet people, I think

- Yes
- Yes, I gained new knowledge about different people
- It's a good start
- Made interesting connections but probably no potential collaborations
- It was good to learn more about the many faculty projects I knew of but had never heard them talk about
- Yes
- Yes, met several people I'll follow up with
- Yes, but briefly, only a few things
- Yes – but I will need to see the slides again
- Yes
- Meeting new people was very helpful
- Meeting others, even with dissimilar interests, helps make me feel more a part of the UF community, whether I contact anyone or not

- Yes, especially in the language department
- I liked the workshop. It was less enlightening this time because I have done this kind of exercise before (always enjoyable)
- Just in general jump starting the idea of reading out and reminding me how it's possible to talk and learn from people in very different fields
- I think so, but I need to let it gel! My discipline is not very collaborative so I feel I'm still learning
- Yes. I learnt about various useful information about my field. I found a connection in my research area
- Yes! Gave me a great resource of new PIs have and how the SSC can provide more resources to help
- Yes! I received a lot of great feedback about my future studies

- It was interesting to meet and talk with people who are doing work/research from across campus who are passionate about their work

- Will look more at sociological perspective in my work, and ..as a culture in long term project
- Yes. I found grant writing resources on campus, and learned about a website through faculty in another dept that gathers academics in one of my research areas
- Yes – I was put in contact with lots of people who have similar/related goals to our office and hope to collaborate so we are complementary in our services
- Yes, I met a couple of people who may be a fit for my site and put two other folds in touch
- Yes
- It was great to have access to people working in grants as well as people who have been through the grant writing process

(Question 7) What was the most useful part of the workshop?
