Abstracto: La colección consiste en un álbum de fotografías promoviendo los viajes de crucero de la compañía Holland América a las Indias Occidentales en 1937. Las fotografías fueron tomadas por el fotógrafo Robert Smith Mathews, con texto narrativo escrito por su hermano, Richard B. Mathews.

Nota biográfica y/o histórica

El SS Statendam fue construido por la compañía Harland y Wolff en Bélgica, para remplazar al segundo SS Statendam, que se hundió durante la Primera Guerra Mundial. El buque navegó regularmente entre 1929 y 1940, cuando fue llamado a regresar a los Países Bajos debido a la amenaza inminente de la Segunda Guerra Mundial. El SS Statendam se incendió el 11 de mayo de 1940 durante la invasión de Alemania-Nazi a los Países Bajos, y los daños causados por el fuego fueron catastróficos; el buque fue declarado perdida total. Robert Mathews (1903-1972), trabajó frecuentemente para los cruceros de la línea Holland América, principalmente entre 1930 y 1939 según información recopilada de registros de aduana en donde aparece su firma. Sus fotografías se publicaron en panfletos, álbumes de promoción, y anuncios para la compañía. Su hermano, Richard Mathews (1901-), viajó muy frecuentemente y aunque estaba inscrito como residente de Nueva York, principalmente vivía a bordo. La familia de los hermanos Mathews era oriunda de Toronto, Ontario, Canadá, pero vivían muy a menudo tanto en Búfalo como en Nueva York. John Mathews, el hermano menor, fue editor del periódico "Detroit Free Press" en Michigan.

Importancia y Contenido

El Álbum de Fotografías del SS Statendam de las Indias Occidentales de 1937, es de 13 ¼" x 11" de tamaño, de tejido acanalado azul. El álbum está encuadrado con tornillos de bronce en el borde con el título, en dorado metálico, en la portada, y contiene [48] hojas, con nueve carteles que describen las escalas del crucero, [32] fotografías de gelatina de plata en color sepia de tamaño 8" x 10", las cuales están rotuladas con título y número de negativo. Este álbum era un álbum con motivo de promoción y recordatorio de los viajes del crucero SS Statendam de la línea Holland América con paradas en Cuba, Islas Vírgenes, Martinica, Trinidad, Venezuela, Curazao, Colombia, el Canal de Panamá, y Jamaica. El álbum documenta un viaje a las Indias Occidentales del SS Statendam en 1937 con fotografías de Robert Mathews y texto por su hermano, Richard Mathews, el cual describe las paradas en los distintos puertos de una manera vívida y detallada. El álbum comienza con una fotografía de un barco de la nave lleno de pasajeros con destino a puerto, seguida por fotografía del Castillo del Morro, el Palacio Presidencial, la playa pública La Playa, en la Habana, y una foto de un "Atardecer Tropical". Otras fotografías incluyen a un joven montado en un burro en las Islas Vírgenes; la montaña Pelé y el mercado en San Pedro, Martinica; una fotografía excepcional de una mujer echando agua en un vaso de una jarra de agua montada en su cabeza, y un molino de vientos en Trinidad; una foto del paisaje agreste de Venezuela, incluyendo fotografías de La Guayra y Caracas; barcos de vela y el mercado en Curazao, y fotografías de Jamaica, El Canal de Panamá, Cartagena, y Colombia.

1	"Martinique Card - Scene of the great volcanic mountain Pelé, and birthplace of the Empress Josephine, first wife of Napoleon Bonaparte, Martinique is among the most famous of the West Indian Islands. Fort de France is the leading port, a town with the atmosphere of the Cote d' Azur, with its lovely marble statue of the Empress Josephine, surrounded by lofty Royal Palms. A favorite drive from Fort de France leads through tropical trails to St.

	Pierre, the Pompeii of the West Indies, a once charming city that was almost totally destroyed by the eruption of Mt. Pelé in May 1902. Here there is a remarkable view of the towering volcanic peak, and an opportunity to explore the ruins of old St. Pierre, which was once the gayest town in the West Indies, a Paris in miniature."

1	Bridgetown Card - "Barbados, in the British Windward Group, although a small island of only 166 square miles area, has always played an important part in the commerce of the West Indies, because of its important crops of sugar cane. The island also has the distinction of having been visited by George Washington, who lived for a time at Bridgetown, the principal port of call. A typical British colonial town, laid out on neat and practical lines, the names of its streets and squares are as English as those of London. The white roads, neat little rose-veered cottages and the great bougainvillea trees add bright splashes of color to the jewel-box Barbados. Text by Richard B. Mathews, Photographs by Robert S. 1	Trinidad Card - "Discovered by Columbus on his third voyage to the New World and named in honor of the Holy Trinity, this important island off the coast of Venezuela is one of the most productive in the West Indies. The administration is British, and Port of Spain, the port of call, with its remarkable Botanical Garden, the handsome government buildings and the pleasant villas, is made even more memorably colorful by its large Hindu population. There are around 100,000 of these East Indians in Trinidad who retain their native costumes and manner of living. For centuries a principal source of the island's wealth has been the famous Pitch Lake, a natural deposit of asphalt. 1	Venezuela Card - "La Guayra presents a breath-taking introduction to the continent of South America, with its green and red background of the lofty Andes and the vivid stucco houses rising in terraces from the sea". A railways which is one of the world's greatest engineering feats and also a fine motor highway connect La Guayra with Caracas, the capital of Venezuela, 22 miles distant and 3,000 feet above the port city. The thrilling drive over the Andes, with its remarkable views of sea and mountain, is one of the most picturesque trips on the West Indies cruise. Caracas is a smartly modern and beautiful city, with wide avenues and the handsome broad Plaza Bolívar with its imposing statue of the liberator of South America. Photographs by Robert S. Willemstad, the chief town, is as Dutch as Edam cheese, with its picturesque streets and spick-and-span houses all neat in a row. Curaçao is a great favorite with cruise travelers to the West Indies as a shopping center. Perfumes, silks, and fine liqueurs are all sold here at low prices, and the pontoon bridge, the old Spanish fort and the broad pleasant bay, form a lasting memory of picturesque Curaçao". 1	Cartagena Card -"On the Caribbean coast of Colombia lies an old city, Cartagena, throbbing with adventurous memories of a time when it was the most important city in Central America. The Statendam anchored in the same harbor where Sir Francis Drake hove to and laid the city in ruins many years ago. Despite or perhaps because of its robust past however, Cartagena is like a city asleep, resting for a recrudescence of grandeur. The romance and adventure of the past returned at night, however, when its harbor shined in the starlight, and the ghosts of

1	Panama Canal Card - "Colón is the Port Said of America, with fascinating shops, oriental bazaars, gay cafes and hectic cabarets. It is a free port, (in more ways than one), and many are the bargains to be picked up as you walk along the covered sidewalks of the shopping district. But it's the Canal that overshadows everything. Four centuries have passed since the King of Spain ordered a survey made for the cutting of the canal across the isthmus, and just twenty years have elapsed since the canal was completed. It is a monument to American determination and engineering skill. One never will forget the sight of the great ships which are quietly lowered or raised by the huge steel gates weighing 700 tons at the Gatun Locks. Text by Richard B. 1	Jamaica Card - "Kingston- the capital city stands near the site of old Port Royal, the town of buccaneers which was destroyed by an earthquake in 1692. As the ship slips into Kingston Harbor, the remains of Port Royal may still be seen. In the center of the city is the Parish Church founded in 1700 and containing a number of monuments and inscriptions relating to various persons prominent in the history of Jamaica. Nearby are the attractive Victoria Gardens and only 19 miles from Kingston are the Castleton Gardens, a remarkable collection of tropical plants and palm trees. Jamaica is a happy vacation playground. Photographs by Robert S. Mathews, Text by Richard B. Mathews."
